Out to Sea in Your 12' Classic Boat But, Where in the World are you?



he Global Positioning System has become almost common place in almost all forms of transportation, from airplanes to boats to automobiles. It's a technology we're beginning to take for granted; but do you understand how it works? You can impress your friends and customers by being able to explain the basics of GPS.

GPS can pinpoint your position anywhere on the globe, usually within a few yards. It uses a constellation of 24 satellites in precise orbits approximately 11,000 miles above the earth. The satellites transmit data via highfrequency radio waves back to Earth

and, by locking onto these signals, a GPS receiver can process this data to find its precise location on the globe.

GPS operates 24 hours a day, in all weather conditions, and can be used worldwide for precise navigation on land, on water, and even in the air. Some of its many current applications include: boating, fishing, hunting, scouting on land or from the air, hiking, camping, biking, rafting, pack trips by horseback, hot air ballooning, general aviation, snowmobiling and skiing, search and rescue, emergency vehicle tracking, four-wheeling, highway driving, and a host of other outdoor activities where accurate positioning is required.

How GPS Determines Your Position

The GPS unit simply measures the travel time of the signals transmitted from the satellites, then multiplies them by the speed of light to determine exactly how far the unit is from every satellite it's sampling. By locking onto the signals from a minimum of three different satellites, a GPS receiver can calculate a 2D (twodimensional) positional fix, consisting of your latitude and longitude. By locking onto a fourth satellite, the GPS can compute a 3D fix, calculating your altitude as well as your latitude/ longitude position.



A Lucky Antique Outboard Lives, Arriving in David Vaughan's

avid Vaughan tells the story, "This outboard was found on the bottom of Lake Arrowhead in the summer of 1962 (41 years ago.)

The engine was originally purchased by Emil Dahl of Point Beach, Milford Connecticut in 1927 or 1928. The last owner, whose son salvaged the Johnson, was Dr. Edward Sedgwick, Professor Emeritus from U.C.L.A.

Dr. Sedgwick moved to Spokane in 1999 in poor health and his daughter, while cleaning out the house, came upon a box full of engine parts which she promptly threw into a dumpster. I was lucky enough to rescue the engine and corroborating literature. The engine has been assembled much like it looked in 1962 and is in running shape."


In Professor Edward Sedgwick's search for parts to restore this motor, he wrote the following reply, May, 1992:

Dear Jerry.

The A-35 cylinder arrived last Tuesday and it is beautiful. You did a perfect clean up job on it and even added a gasket, which you must have made.

My search for this part began in July 1960 when our son Ed discovered the A-35 Johnson at the bottom of Lake Arrowhead. Only a rubber grip on the tiller was showing in the mud. Ed thought it was part of a bicycle. When he lifted it he sank into the mud with the motor. It was too heavy to swim with and if he left it in the ooze it would sink out of sight in a few minutes. He had no markers with him and his partner, Richard Karas wisely returned to our dock when Ed playfully turned off the air on his scuba gear.

Ed decided to "walk" ashore along the bottom while sinking into the mud up to



his knees with every step. He surfaced at the first dock he came to which was several docks south of our dock. He then proceeded to plunk the mud covered motor down on our neighbor's dock. Ed, who was completely covered with mud looked like a prehistoric monster stepping out of the primordial ooze.

Mrs. Johnson, who was not the rugged type, was dozing on the chaise lounge on her dock. Unfortunately, she didn't recognize Ed and let out a terrified scream you could hear for blocks.

By the time I ran to her dock Ed had identified himself and offered to clean up the Johnson's dock. He and Richard then carried the motor to my basement work shop, disassembled it, washed, dried and wrapped the parts in newspaper.

I promised Ed I would locate a replacement cylinder and restore the motor. My 32 year search was more than I bargained for but your contribution was like finding the Holy Grail. You know the story of my joining the A.O.M.C., my participation in the Long Beach auction and there were countless other "blind alleys." With the cylinder you sent me and cannibalized parts from the \$15 motor I bought at the auction, I am ready to start the restoration job. Many, many thanks Jerry.

In reply to Professor Edward Sedgwick's search for parts, W.J. Marabella from Johnson Motors Service Department wrote the following on May 31, 1963:

DEAR MR. SEDGWICK:

IN REPLY TO YOUR LETTER OF MAY 22, MOTOR BEARING SERIAL #71656 IS A MODEL A-35 JOHNSON OUTBOARD MOTOR THAT WAS MANUFACTURED IN 1927-1928 WITH A HORSEPOWER RATING OF 2 1/2 AT 2600 RPM. OUR RECORDS INDICATE THAT THE MOTOR WAS ORIGINALLY REGISTERED BY A MR. EMIL DAHL, POINT BEACH, MILFORD, CONNECTICAT

AS THE MODEL A-35 MOTOR IS RATHER OLD, WE ARE SORRY TO ADVISE YOU THAT WE DO NOT HAVE PARTS, PARTS CATALOGS, INSTRUC-TION MANUAL OR ANY OTHER LITERA-TURE AVAILABLE FOR SAME. DUE TO THE AGE OF THE MOTOR, IT IS DOUBTFUL THAT ANY PARTS COULD BE OBTAINED ANYWHERE; HOWEVER, SHOULD YOU DESIRE TO ATTEMPT TO OBTAIN PARTS, WE MIGHT SUGGEST THAT YOU CONTACT OUTBOARD MOTOR MART, INC., 229 STATE STREET, BOSTON, MASSACHUSETTS, AS THIS FIRM DOES CARRY A STOCK OF PARTS FOR OLDER TYPE MOTORS AND MIGHT POSSIBLY BE IN A POSITION TO BE OF ASSISTANCE TO YOU.


ike any good motor freak l can't resist a junk motor pile.

One thing that is all too common in Catalina's junk piles is a large amount of Evinrude 48 Special lower units. Most are still sporting stainless steel props worth about \$300.00 each.

The obvious question. . . Why not salvage the props?

The answer, the props were the culprit in the early demise of the lowerunit. The extra weight of the stainless steel props can increase the strain of shifting up to five times the amount of standard aluminum prop.


Many of our Classic motors have brass props considerably heavier than the standard aluminum props. Shifting after the prop has stopped spinning should prove prudent.



GPS was conceived in the 1970's, and is controlled by the United States Department of Defense. Although GPS was initially envisioned for military use, the government realized early on that there would be numerous civilian applications as well. Subsequently, the Department of Defense created two transmission codes; the P code (Precision code) for military use, and the C/A code (Civilian Access code) for civilian use.

Now boaters, aviators, drivers, hikers, and hunters can locate their position up to ten times more precisely (within 10 to 20 meters) and navigate their way through unfamiliar terrain. Anglers can now return to their favorite spot on a lake or river instead of just their favorite area.

The decision to allow civilians so much accuracy in location information was finally made because GPS is continually playing a more important role in the lives of people around the world - it's becoming a national utility. GPS is the global standard in navigation because it is completely free of charge to the public.

Brand new from Livorsi Marine is the GPS satelite-controlled Tournament Ski Speedo. It uses the GPS satellite technology to provide the skier or wake-boarder with precise speed readings. The 0-52 mph Speedo has bold numbers and an expanded scale dial with the "ski zone" of 16-36 mph displaying marks every 1/2 mph. Plus, there is no need to calibrate for wind and current. The Tournament Ski Speedo also has memory recall to show the highest speed reached, as well as average speed.
